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New Regulation Changes Procedures that Govern Employment of Persons with Disabilities

The Office of Personnel Management (OPM) last week announced the issuance of the final regulation concerning the excepted service appointments of persons with intellectual disabilities, severe physical disabilities, and psychiatric disabilities.

These final rules eliminate the current requirement that an applicant supply a certification of job readiness in order to be appointed pursuant to this authority, proposes a change of wording, and provides other clarifications on appointments under this authority. The changes support the President's policy of increasing the Federal employment of individuals with disabilities.

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Updates on Implementation of ACA Provisions

1. Health Care Law Protects Consumers against Worst Insurance Practices

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) last Friday issued a final rule that implements five key consumer protections from the Affordable Care Act, and makes the health insurance market work better for individuals, families, and small businesses.

Under these reforms, all individuals and employers have the right to purchase health insurance coverage regardless of health status. In addition, insurers are prevented from charging discriminatory rates to individuals and small employers based on factors such as health status or gender, and young adults have additional affordable coverage options under catastrophic plans.

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2. HHS Providing States with Additional Flexibility, Resources to Enhance Care

Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius last week announced the first recipients of State Innovation Model awards made possible by the Affordable Care Act. Nearly \$300 million in awards will provide flexibility and support to states to help them deliver high-quality health care, lower costs and improve their health system performance.

Model Testing awards will support Arkansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Oregon, and Vermont in implementing their plans for health care delivery system transformation. The six selected states will use funds to test multi-payer payment and service delivery models, including approaches already under way at the Centers of Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), such as Accountable Care Organizations, on a broader scale within their state. Through the State Innovation Model Testing awards, CMS will learn whether these new models produce greater results when implemented broadly and combined with additional state-wide reforms.

An additional 19 states will receive awards to further develop proposals for comprehensive health care transformation.

HHS also released last week a new report titled [Medicaid Moving Forward](#), which underscores the innovative efforts states and HHS have already undertaken to improve care and lower costs in their Medicaid programs. It highlights recent initiatives underway to support state efforts to achieve the goals of improving care and lowering costs in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). It also outlines specific examples of how states are using these tools to advance their own state initiatives. This report identifies current opportunities states can take advantage of now.

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3. New Health Care Law Allows Consumers to Easily Find and Compare Options Starting in 2014

Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius today announced a final rule that will make purchasing health coverage easier for consumers. The policies outlined today will give consumers a consistent way to compare and enroll in health coverage in the individual and small group markets, while giving states and insurers more flexibility and freedom to implement the Affordable Care Act.

Today's rule outlines health insurance issuer standards for a core package of benefits, called essential health benefits, that health insurance issuers must cover both inside and outside the Health Insurance Marketplace. Through its standards for essential health benefits, the final rule released today also expands coverage of mental health and substance use disorder services, including behavioral health treatment, for millions of Americans.

A new report by HHS, also released today, details how these provisions will expand mental health and substance use disorder benefits and federal parity protections for 62 million more Americans.

Policies in today's rule also provide more information on accreditation standards for qualified health plans (QHPs) that will be offered through the Health Insurance Marketplaces (also known as Exchanges), one-stop shops that will provide access to quality, affordable private health insurance choices.

Evaluations of interventions directed toward preventing suicidal behavior have shown that promoting connectedness is a promising suicide prevention strategy. Connectedness to others, including family members, teachers, coworkers, community organizations, and social institutions, is an important protective factor. Positive relationships can help increase a person's sense of belonging, foster a sense of personal worth, and provide access to sources of support.

During this webinar, participants will learn why and how the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention made connectedness promotion a central focus of its suicide prevention efforts. Presenters will describe programs that have promoted connectedness within specific populations including: older adults, American Indians and Alaska Natives, and African American youth.

1. NLRC Webinar Explores What's in Store for Older Adults (50-64) Under Health Care Reform

2014 marks a new era for health insurance in the United States. The establishment of health insurance exchanges, or marketplaces, and the expansion of Medicaid eligibility in many states will enable millions of people to access affordable insurance. Prior to health reform, older adults, between 50 and 64, faced significant challenges accessing insurance, including limited coverage in Medicaid, unaffordable premiums on the private insurance market, and policies on pre-existing conditions that render many effectively "uninsurable."

This webinar will focus on how key provisions of the Affordable Care Act can help older adults access the insurance and benefits they need, such as:

- Expanded Medicaid eligibility to 138% Federal Poverty Limit (FPL) for adults under 65
- Access to federal subsidies to help pay for insurance premiums for individuals and families up to 400% FPL
- Required Essential Health Benefits, including no cost sharing preventive screening and annual wellness visits
- Limitations on how much extra a plan can charge for premiums based on the beneficiary's age
- Guaranteed issue insurance that forbids health plans from denying coverage or charging extra for pre-existing conditions
- Delivery system innovations, including initiatives to coordinate care like the health homes

2011 SPR Data Is Now Available on AGID

The 2011 State Program Report (SPR) [data](#) is now available on AGID.

The Administration on Aging (AoA) AGing Integrated Database (AGID) is an on-line query system based on AoA-related data files and surveys, and includes population characteristics from the U.S. Census Bureau for comparison purposes. The system allows users to produce descriptive information in graphical or tabular form, at the level of detail most suited for their needs. The four options or paths through AGID provide different levels of focus and

aggregation of the data – from individual data elements within Data-at-a-Glance to full database access within Data Files.

1. WebAIM Surveys

WebAIM has launched two surveys – a *Survey of Users with Low Vision* and a *Survey of Users with Motor Disabilities*. [WebAIM](#) helps government, private and public organizations to make their Web content accessible. Survey findings will be used in the design and creation of accessible Web content. Individuals with low vision and motor disabilities are invited to complete these brief surveys.

2. US Access Board to Form Advisory Committee to Review Its ADA Accessibility Guidelines for Transportation Vehicles

The U.S. Access Board is forming an [advisory committee](#) to help in the review and update of its [Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines for Transportation Vehicles](#). It is looking for nominations for membership in the committee. The Rail Vehicles Access Advisory Committee will develop recommendations for updating the guidelines that cover vehicles of fixed guideway systems, including rapid, light, commuter, intercity, and high speed trains. Deadline for applications is **April 1, 2013**.

3. EEOC Seeks Input on Form to Better Track Data of People with Disabilities in Federal Jobs

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) has announced that it plans to revise an EEOC form (Demographic Information on Applicants, OMB No. 3046-0046) to include disability status data. The revision would help the EEOC and federal agencies track progress on recruitment and hiring strategies which directs agencies to increase hiring of people with disabilities. Currently, the form only tracks race, ethnicity and sex. The [comment](#) deadline is **April 16, 2013**.

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Million Hearts Releases New Spanish-Language Resources on Heart Health
Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death among US Hispanics

Educational resources to help Hispanics take control of their heart health is available from Million Hearts, a national public-private partnership that works to prevent 1 million heart attacks and strokes by 2017.

The new educational resources provide action steps and tips:

- The *Four Steps for Heart Health* fact sheet encourages individuals to work with their health care team to focus on the Million Hearts ABCS—**A**spirin for people at risk (people who have already experienced a heart attack or certain type of stroke and their doctor has advised them to take aspirin to prevent another), **B**lood pressure control, **C**holesterol management, and **S**moking cessation— to help prevent heart attacks and strokes.
- *How to Control Your Hypertension/Learning to Control Your Sodium Intake: a Fotonovela* is an illustrated booklet that includes multi-generational advice on getting high blood pressure control by reducing sodium and is designed to be integrated into community health programs.
- The *Million Hearts website En Espanol* offers guidance and tools for improving heart health, including a heart risk calculator, a journal to record blood pressure readings and track progress, and links to other resources.
