Debt & Loans: Common concerns about financial transitions and stability



- Student loan and medical bill repayment options
- Paying mortgage and utility bills in times of financial strain
- Credit report error disputes

Food Resources: Assistance from local and federal food services and programs

- Applying for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Locating local food banks and other resources
- Options if you cannot access food stores

Health Care: Parts of and coverage options through Medicare

 How and when you can enroll and change coverage



- Financial assistance to help pay for Medicare
- Options if you don't qualify for Medicare

Homeowner Assistance: Financial concerns and assistance



- Counselors approved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- How mortgage servicers can help during tough times
- Home modification options for accessibility

Assistance for Renters: Tenant rights and options when facing difficulties paying rent



- State rental assistance and housing counseling agencies
- HUD's Support Housing for the Elderly Program
- Requesting changes to your living space for accessibility and safety

Social Security: Various benefits and related services

 Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) eligibility



- Application process and choosing when to start receiving benefits
- Transition from Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) to retirement benefits

Taxes: Tax process and related options for retirees

- Free tax preparation tools and services to help with filing
- Options for resolving tax debts
- Support from organizations like the Taxpayer Advocate Service
