






Kara Ayers, PhD

Level setting with our language



- People with IDD are more than 7 times more likely to experience sexual assault than people without disabilities. Women with disabilities were 12 times as likely.
- Abuse is often <u>repeated</u> and <u>chronic</u>.
 Abuse is often committed by paid service providers and occur in disability service settings.
- Few of these crimes are reported.
- Charges and conviction of perpetrators are rare.

Ableism

Ableism can be covert but is still poisonous.

How ableism contributes to this problem...



Stereotypes about people with disabilities, like we are not sexual beings, are dangerous.



Many people with disabilities are denied sexual education.



Fear, isolation, and uncertainty can combine to make telling someone or seeking help more difficult.



The victim may have a negative history with law enforcement. Interviews can be inaccessible.



Communication access



Accessible and safe alternatives to abusive people and settings
